BURNING REGULATIONS

Douglas County regulations prohibit burning within 100 feet of the ordinary high water level of a public water and/or within a drainage ditch that discharges into waters of the state. Ashes are very high in phosphorus and contribute to excess algae and weed growth. A wood burning campfire less than three feet in diameter, designed to enclose ash for removal would be exempt from this rule.

Home burning of household waste is illegal for everyone except farm households that have no garbage pickup service.

PLEASE DO NOT DEPOSIT LEAVES OR GRASS INTO THE LAKE OR DITCHES. THESE ARE POLLUTANTS AND ALSO CONTRIBUTE TO INCREASED LEVELS OF PHOSPHORUS AND TO EXCESS ALGAE AND WEED GROWTH.

• ROAD BUMPS (Submitted by Allen Hayes Dist. 11)

Why dirt roads develop a washboard surface as reported in the August 18, 2007 issue of "Science News This Week".

Vehicles passing constantly over dirt roads create an irksome washboard surface. Several physicists have conducted several experiments as to why this phenomenon occurs. Their research has explained why washboard forms, and the dispiriting message for road crews: Scrape often, or give up. Washboard is inevitable. There is only one solution: Slow down a lot. The critical velocity below which (the surface) would remain flat is about 5 miles per hour.
